Family Grants Conservation Easement on Rock Hill Farm

Last year, three generations of the Whisonant family jointly agreed to grant a conservation easement on their 309-acre farm which borders the Rock Hill Country Club. The easement was finalized in July of this year and accepted by Nation Ford Land Trust. This action taken by Al Whisonant, Jo Anne Pafford, and the entire Whisonant family permanently preserves the land and protects it from future development.

We congratulate the Whisonant family on this most important decision. We also wish to recognize the York County Forever Commission and

Ken Driggers of the Palmetto Conservation Foundation for their guidance and assistance given the Whisonant family throughout the entire process.

Nation Ford Land Trust and The Palmetto Conservation Foundation are teaming with York County Forever to conserve about 10,000 acres of land by 2010.

York County Grants Two Easements

York County granted two conservation easements to Nation Ford Land Trust in July of this year. The first easement is on the Dalton Ranch, 1,647 acres located on Broad River in the Broad River and Bullock Creek Townships. This easement will promote access to the Broad River and related recreational uses associated with the property while assuring that the historic, cultural, habitat, natural, scenic, recreational and associated open space features of the property will be retained and maintained forever. York County purchased the land from Harry and Becca Dalton in November 2000. The property is one of the first pieces of land acquired by the county under York County Forever.

The second easement is on Ferguson Mountain (or Nanny's Mountain) located in Bethel Township. The conservation easement on this 115-acre tract will preserve the ecological and historic integrity of Ferguson Mountain. York County purchased the land in November 1997 with the help of Nation Ford Land Trust.

Annual Meeting and Autumn Party Scheduled

From the Chairman

The York County Council recently voted to adopt a Purchase of Development Rights (PDR) program as a part of their York County Forever plan. This action will have far-reaching and long-term benefits as the county deals with growth issues.

York County Forever was envisioned to have three major components of land conservation. These could be likened to a three-legged stool with the three legs being as follows:

- 1 Purchase of land (fee simple title)
- 2 Voluntary conservation easements
- 3 Purchase of development rights

York County Forever has been highly successful, but thusfar has only used purchase of land and voluntary easements as part of their program. The implementation of PDRs promises even greater success for York County Forever.

The use of PDRs will enable the county to preserve open space much more cost effectively. The cost of a PDR is much cheaper than the outright purchase of land. This will enable the county to get much more "bang for the tax dollar" in its open space conservation effort. Also, the county will not have the liabilities associated with owned land.

Congratulations are in order to the York County Council for making this important decision which will have such a positive impact on the quality of life for our citizens. York County continues to be a leader in our region as they deal with growth issues.

The Nation Ford Land Trust and The Palmetto Conservation Foundation are pleased to have the opportunity to continue to partner with York County Forever to accomplish its mission.
