NFLT Accepts Easement Near McConnells Highway

Spratt and Sandra Hagler White have signed a 166 acre conservation easement near McConnells Highway in southern York County. The original 51 acres were purchased in the 1960's by Sandra's parents, Walter and Jeanette McElhaney Hagler, and passed down to Sandra during the 1980's. Over the years, Spratt and Sandra added to the initial 51 acres when the opportunity was available. A small portion of the property is currently leased to farmers where cotton, corn, soy or milo is grown. The rest of the property is covered in open fields and natural hardwood forests.

York County Forever provided the funding for this easement which lies in close proximity to the Chappell Farm and Historic Brattonsville. Both, Spratt and Sandra felt the need to protect their naturally beautiful and scenic property from possible development so the land can be enjoyed in its inherent state.

U.S. Fish and Wildlife Grant for Pollinator Garden

A few years ago, NFLT received a grant that provided funds to construct a pollinator garden at Banks Trail Middle School. The project has taken some time to move forward during the past few years but progress is being made. The grant is funding a 4,000 sq ft pollinator garden consisting of butterfly milkweed, white wild indigo, New England aster, sweet grass and several other native species. The grant has already provided a walking path for students to utilize from the library to an outdoor learning area. Rose Anne Keller, a teacher at Banks Trail Middle School, has headed the pollinator garden project for the past four years and will finally see the completed garden in Spring 2017. NFLT and U.S. FW plan to work with Rose Anne and school staff to organize an educational session with students about the need for pollinators and emphasizing the importance of native plant species.

Anticipated Easement with Rare "Blackjack" Soil

Steve Boyd is in the final stages to sign an easement with NFLT. The anticipated easement consists of 1000 acres on three separate neighboring properties in Chester County. This property possess a unique soil type referred to as Blackjack. This rare soil is considered threatened by the United States Natural Resource Conservation Service . "Blackjack" soils are known for their agricultural productivity and have the highest moisture holding capacity of any soil type found in South Carolina.

The funding for this easement will be provided by the South Carolina Conservation Land Bank. Steve Boyd also made a \$700,000 donation to the easement.

10th Anniversary of the Nation Ford Greenway

On July 26th 2007, the Nation Ford Greenway opened

its first trailhead at A.O. Jones Boulevard in Fort Mill. Anne Springs Close led the first hike on this two mile trail segment. Over the years, the trail has grown in length, gained a suspension bridge and worked with local community members and organizations. The NFG has been and continues to be



committed to its mission to connect the Carolinas.

NFLT Receives PRT Grant

In Fall of 2016, NFLT accepted a \$100,000 grant from the South Carolina Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism Department (PRT). This PRT grant and the grant NFLT received from the Carolina Thread Trail (CTT) last year will be used to construct a 2 mile trail along the Catawba River. This trail will become a part of the CTT's North-South spine, a planned 140 mile continuous trail stretching from Statesville, NC to Great Falls, SC. The completion of this 2 mile segment is projected for the summer of 2018.
